

Place Standard Tool workshop

On 30 November I attended an event hosted by <u>SURF</u> (Scotland's Regeneration Forum) and Public Health Scotland on the Place Standard Tool (PST). This was a chance to hear updates on the tool and to input into the Place Standard Tool Delivery Plan 2024-28.



My two key takeaways from the session were firstly that the tool is primarily intended for use in structuring community conversations about place, but there is an awareness of the need for development of the online tool if it is to be used for data collection and analysis. In the meantime, I am working on methods for data analysis based on use of the online group tool and would be happy to share insights on this with groups.

Secondly, that I think the climate lens version should be integrated with the main tool, as the climate emergency is too urgent to see this as an optional extra and local measures to address climate change should be integrated into all planning. This would also ensure Local Place Plans based on PST engagement will align with the NPF4 (the current version of the National

Planning Framework) and therefore make a stronger case to influence statutory planning and attract funding. I put this recommendation forward and felt it had been listened to.

Local Place Plan of the month



This month I would like to highlight the <u>Local Place Plan for Stromness</u>. This is a great example of a well-presented plan, with a map-based approach throughout. Pages 13 - 16 are a good place to look if your group is at the community engagement planning phase, so you can get tips on the kind of information to collect for presentation in your plan, such as photos of engagement sessions, hits on relevant social media posts, numbers at each event etc.
